





- International Conferences- July 7-9-Portland, OR, July 21-24 San Antonio, TX and July 28-31 Tampere, Finland


I hope everyone has a wonderful holiday season, please continue to wear your masks and practice social distancing. I hope that we can meet in person in 2021.

STATE TREASURER'S REPORT~ Carol LaPolice



Letter: DKG Christa McAulíffe Lívíng Memorial Fund Submitted by Línda Tíley

Hello DKG sisters!

I am so grateful to have received the Christa McAuliffe Living Memorial Fund award late last spring. These funds enabled me to enroll in a graduate course called Law, Ethics and the Educator. I had been trying to take this class for over 2 years, but my school district did not have the funding for me, and I was not able to pay for this on my own. The class was originally scheduled to be a Hybrid Model, with 6 in person sessions, but by the end of April, the entire course was moved to on-line. As the spring of 2020 unfolded, and the COVID-19 global pandemic changed our world, it was fascinating and also empowering to watch my professor, a superintendent, struggle with the same things we teachers had been trying to accomplish with our students. One of my favorite moments in the first class was when he said "This is really hard. I'm used to being able to walk around the room and see your faces and body language to get a better sense of the group."

I learned a lot, and was able to tailor my capstone project to special education issues, which is my specialty within education. In mid-August, I was surprised to be contacted by a former colleague who encouraged me to apply for a job in her district. So after over a year of working towards this kind of move, and with a pandemic still rampant, this fall I unexpectedly began a new position. I have no doubt that my ability to reference completing this course in my job interview helped tip the scale in my favor.

MEMBERSHIP MATTERS~MARILYN SPEDDING

Collegiate Members

Collegiate members shall be undergraduate or graduate students who meet the following criteria:

- They shall be enrolled in, or have graduate standing with, an institution offering an educational degree
- They shall have the intent to continue academically and professionally in the field of education
- They shall be enrolled in the last two years of their degree
- They shall be selected by the method established by the chapter rules
- They may participate in the activities of the Society except holding office
- They may serve as parliamentarian since that position is not an officer

Collegiate members who graduate and become a paid educator shall pay active member dues and become an active member of the Society. If a collegiate member does not pursue a career as an educator, her membership will expire upon graduation or withdrawal from the education degree program.

International dues for collegiate members are \$20.00 as set by the International Executive Board and approved by the DKG International convention. The Massachusetts State Organization and the individual chapters may add local dues for the collegiate members.

Collegiate members have all the privileges of membership except that of holding office and have no obligations except payment of dues.

Collegiate status is granted by a majority vote of the chapter.


