

# AMENDMENTS TO THE STATE BY-LAWS~ Martha Cotton

The following amendments to our state by-laws were approved by the Executive Board at the February, 2020 Winter Board meeting. In that we were not able to have the final vote in May, they will now be voted on by the members in attendance at the **Fall Convention on October 3, 2020.** Please note that there has been one change to Article I, Section A (Name) approved on May 2, 2020. The abbreviation Inc. will NOT be included in our new state name.

The MA State Organization By-Laws and Standing Rules shall be amended automatically by the State By-Laws Committee or other designated body to comply with changes made to the DKG International Constitution and International Standing Rules.

II

Under Article VI Section C. Composition and Duties of Committees, Section 3 Educational Services: US forum, amend Representative appointed by President to read: One or more representatives appointed by president. III

Under Article III Membership:

Amendment will read the membership of MA State Organization shall be composed of active, reserve, collegiate and honorary members.

IV

Under Article IV Finance

Amended

International, Chapter and State Organization will determine dues for the collegiate members. State Organization dues for collegiate members, if any, shall be determined at the Spring Convention.

V

Under Article IV Finance Section A 3. Add the following: If a member joins between January  $1^{st}$  – March  $31^{st}$  in any given year, the dues shall be prorated by  $\frac{1}{2}(50\%)$ .

VI Under Article VIII Section A 2 Committees: The Committees should be listed according to current practice. Personal Growth, Professional Affairs, Research and Music shall be included under the Educational Excellence Committee VII

Article I Section A Name

The name of the state organization shall be changed from Alpha Upsilon Massachusetts, of The Delta Kappa Gamma Society International, Inc. to MA State Organization of The Delta Kappa Gamma Society International.

# U.S. FORUM~ Carol LaPolíce

Unfortunately, due to the pandemic, the U.S. Forum was not able to hold the 2020 National Legislative Seminar in Washington, D.C. in March. However, Carol LaPolice our MA U.S. Forum Representative, submitted a position paper to the Executive Board outlining three issues that would have been addressed at the Seminar. The intention is to have DKG members contact their local legislators to support legislation that addresses these critical and ongoing issues:

#### 1. Increase Mental Health Services to Support our Youth

Access to education at younger ages in the school setting should be increased to eliminate formation of negative attitudes towards conditions of mental illness reducing tendencies towards bullying behaviors and its possible consequences (addiction, youth suicide, and increased dropout rate). Understanding and knowledge of mental health conditions and proactive self-support skills need to be taught at a younger age. Students need education on coping, problem solving and self-empowerment skills.

#### 2. Combating Human Trafficking

Human trafficking numbers are underreported according to the polarisproject.org. Most at risk are the recently relocated, substance abusers, mentally ill, runaways and homeless youth. Treat the victims as victims not criminals. More funding for identification and trauma support will be needed.

#### 3. Reducing Gun Violence Pertaining to Students

Increase protection at schools and campuses through stricter background checks and mandatory gun safety education for families. Equally important are mental health services to identify and support students needing services at earlier ages. As reported in everytownresearch.org an analysis of school violence from 2008 through 2017 showed 76% of shooters in 25 incidents using firearms acquired the gun from a relative's or own home.
