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

MEET THE ALPHA UPSILON STATE NOMINEES FOR OFFICERS

JILLAYNE FLANDERS: FIRST VICE-PRESIDENT



Jill has been an active member of Alpha Epsilon Chapter for 30 years. She has served in every role, most recently as Chapter Treasurer, and several bienniums as President.

In the 80s, Dorothea was a Seekonk Special Ed Middle School Para. She is a nationally certified RAINBOW Facilitator assisting children through the stages of grief. Dorothea holds degrees in Thanatology (grief education) and Psychology and attended the Buzzards Bay Writing Project Summer Teaching Institute at UMASS Dartmouth. She became an Assoc. Director assisting with Summer Institutes. Dorothea wrote a grant through BBWP to facilitate an after-school writing group for fourth and fifth graders attending the Alfred J. Gomes School in New Bedford. The J.B. Fernandes Memorial Trust 1 approved the grant and, the students were able to participate in two eight-week sessions. Dorothea and her husband Russ, an Elementary PE teacher and poet, facilitated the program. As a retired MA licensed Real Estate Broker and licensed MA Real Estate Instructor, Dorothea is aware of the difficulty in keep adult learners engaged. She looks forward to assisting new chapter presidents in feeling comfortable in their position.

STATE SERVICE PROJECT

Reach Out and Read



Thank you to the Chapters that have donated to the state service project Reach out and Read. Reach Out and Read Massachusetts promotes early language development skills and health through established systems of well-child visits with an intervention that has the potential to reach all young children in the state's 47 counties. As Reach Out and Read's flagship state, Massachusetts has been on the forefront of early childhood development and literacy since it's very first program opened at the Boston Medical Center over 30 years ago.

In Massachusetts, Reach Out and Read serves 223,000 children annually at 285 program sites and distributes 377,000 books. LEGISLATIVE UPDATES FOR 2021

FEDERAL LEGISLATIVE UPDATE: 2021 GPO-WEP NEWS

As we enter 2021, the 117th Congress begins. Now new bills must be filed for the new session. The *SOCIAL SECURITY FAIRNESS ACT* has been the vehicle to repeal both offsets. As of now, there has not been a Social Security Fairness Act of 2021 filed, but it is anticipated that one will be forthcoming. Once it is filed, it will be important that members of the Massachusetts congressional delegation sign on as co-sponsors **immediately.** Under House rules, if a bill gets 290 co-sponsors, that bill must come up for a vote in the House. Reaching the 290 co-sponsor threshold could provide a procedural avenue to advance the legislation. There may be a "call-to-action" to contact your Representatives in Congress.

STATE LEGISLATIVE UPDATE: ENSURING A DIGNIFIED RETIREMENT

FAIR AND DIGNIFIED RETIREMENT BILL

- Immediately increase the COLA base from \$13,000 to \$18,000 and overtime to raise the base to align with SS maximum allowable benefit
- Freeze municipal retiree premium contribution rates
- Cap out-of-pocket expense for non-Medicare-eligible retirees

EARLY RETIREMENT INCENTIVE BILL

- Provides MTRS members with an option to purchase additional years in age or years of service (or a combination of the two)
- This incentive would be open to MTRS members who agree to purchase their time and retire during the limited enrollment period
- Mandatory backfill language would be included in order to avoid teacher shortages

MTRS RETIREMENT-PLUS BILL

• To correct a Retirement-Plus enrollment issue impacting certain members of the MTRS



U.S FORUM ~ Carol LaPolice North East Representative

The US Forum Steering Committee featured Dr Sylvia Johnson on their February 24th online program on *Legislative Issues for the 117th Congress*.

Dr. Johnson, a DKG member and lobbyist with the National Educators Association, gave an overview of the changes in congressional leadership roles and its effect on the passage of legislation. She shared the new administration's goals for the future including:

- Historic increases for programs service the most in-need students and full-service community schools
- Modernization of infrastructure of schools
- Rewriting he Higher Education Actt o encourage a diversity pool and relief for student loan borrowers
- Racial, Social and Economic Justice
- Police Reforms
- Paycheck Fairness
- Immigrant reform and pathways to citizenship
- Improved child nutrition
- Strengthening retirement security
- Addressing tax fairness
- Strengthen the Affordable Care Act for improved access, lower drug and healthcare costs

Dr Johnson shared the need for retirement security and had some fairly good news. H.R. 82, the Social Security Fairness Act, is a bill for **full repeal** of the Government Pension Offset (GPO) and Windfall Elimination Provision (WEP) acts. These acts unfairly reduce or eliminate social security benefits for dedicated retired teachers through no fault of their own. The GPO affects 695,000 educators, mostly women, and it reduces Social Security **spousal or survivor benefits** by 2/3 of public pension with 9 out of 10 losing their **entire** spousal benefit.

The WEP affects approximately 2 million and that number is still growing as more people enter education after having worked in the private sector. It reduces **retirement, disability, spousal, or survivor benefits**. The downside to this bill is the anticipated cost of \$80-90 billion. However, a bill, The Public Servants Protection and Fairness Act, is being re-filed this year by House Ways and Means Chairman and MA Representative, Richie Neal that offers a less costly solution.

Retirees affected by the WEP only would get \$150 more monthly with future retirees getting \$75.00 on average. According to Dr Johnson this is a good first step and could bring us somewhere in the middle, talking points to use with legislators are:

- GPO and WEP penalize educators who dedicate their lives to **public service**
- GPO and WEP **discourage** people from becoming educators, especially those in mid-career
- We (NEA) support **full repeal** of GPO and WEP, including incremental steps toward full repeal There are some states not affected by this issue. When I asked how we can get them onboard she suggested that we can contact their legislative staff to make them aware of the human impact on our citizens and point out that it applies to the economy for all of us.

Another important bill relating to pensions is the Emergency Pension Plan Relief Act of 2021 (EPPRA). You may have a family member impacted by a pension that is in danger of running out of funds. This act will preserve the Pension Benefit Guaranty Corporation ("PBGC") funding with new rules for those affected.

While we are moving towards vaccinations for educators in MA, I questioned how those who may become ill will be helped. In the new COVID relief bill 10 additional days of sick leave are included.

Student testing, required by the ESSA- Every Student Succeeds Act that replaced No Child Left Behind, will not be waived by the Department of Education (ED). The only thing we can do about MCAS is to share the stories of our students at the local and state levels as the ED guidance gives some options on how to test and usage of data. Johnson reminds us that Congress is moved by stories.

Finally, when ask how our organization can be more effective, Johnson replied, "By calling and emailing our legislatorseach represents a vote." Also, run for office, even at the local level, local politics matter. We have 1800 educators in office right now including the First Lady, Dr. Jill Biden!






