

As you know in 1929 Annie Webb Blanton founded Delta Kappa Gamma Society International and then on June 30, 1941, Alpha Upsilon Massachusetts was chartered in Springfield, MA. Over the years the organization has grown internationally and locally. However, over the past ten years we have been slowly losing more members than we have been bringing into the organization. We are now down to 15 chapters and just under 500 members. So now it's time for us to work together to revitalize our state organization so that we will be strong and healthy for DKG's 100th birthday celebration in 2029 and so we can continue to promote professional and personal growth of women educators and excellence in education for many more years to come! We need **EVERYONE** to get involved and help with this task! Here's a look at some of the things that we've been working on and ways that you can help.

NEWS FROM THE 2022 US FORUM

The Mental Health for Educational Staff Resolution was adopted at the US Forum meeting during the International Convention. This document is available for your use and can be found at www.dkgusforum.com. Each state will be working to bring the mental health needs of educational staff to the attention of the public and effect change. Learn more at the Fall MA State Conference! Elections were held and we have a new NE Representative—Beverly Johns from IL and reps from the SW, SE and NW. Darlene Cook, OR, is the new Chair of the US Forum. It was a great experience being the New England Rep and I encourage you to look at all opportunities available to you through DKG. Food Insecurity was the featured speaker topic. Louisiana is the state with the greatest food insecurity problem.

After the election, I gave a legislative update on PFAS/PFOS. This very important topic pertains to the health of everyone. What are PFAS/PFOS/PFOA's? Perfluoroalkyl and polyfluroalkyl substances (PFAS) perfluorooctanoic acid (PFOA) and perfluorooctanesulfonic acid (PFOS) are chemicals with stain-resistant, water-repellent, grease- proof properties and their

use has been linked to a wide-range of health problems including cancer. Scientists are concerned about their cumulative effects from exposure to products, drinking water and contaminated food. They can be found in makeup, clothing, and food containers. While states, including MA, have taken steps to combat the problems more needs to be done on the national level. H.R. 2467 PFAS Action Act of 2021 is in Senate Environment & Public Works Committee and requires the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to designate these chemicals as hazardous substances and determine if they are toxic chemicals under the Clean Water Act. If so, regulations concerning limits to discharge into U.S. waters will be established as well as additional regulations.

On May 27th a new bill, H.R. 7897 PFAS Reference Standards Act, was sent to the House Energy Conference Committee. A Senate committee hearing was held on June 22 concerning delays by the EPA in determining standard definitions of PFAS.

On the Windfall Elimination Project (WEP)/Government Pension Offset (GPO)- H.R. 82, offering full repeal, has enough votes in the House. However, it is unlikely to pass the Senate with only 40 of 60 votes needed. The best scenario for passage is Rep Neal's (H.R. 2337) or Rep Brady's (H.R.5834) bills that focus solely on the WEP, revising its formula. The WEP is based on your social security record. There are close to 2 million retirees affected by this amendment. This fall could bring some results.

State news- a 5% Cost of Living Adjustment was voted in for FY2023 on a \$13,000 base due to great pension performance for state and teacher retirees. Not passed was an increase for the state and teacher retirees COLA base. *Mass Retirees* made a proposal that it be increased to \$16,000, but due to the timing of the 3year reevaluation of the pension funding schedule it was delayed in the legislature. It will be revisited in the Fall.



On Wednesday August 17th members of the MA State Chapter of DKG assembled at the MSAA Office in Franklin, MA for Leadership Training. The training was led by the "Golden Girls" - otherwise known as those members who have taken part in the training offered by DKGSI formerly known as Golden Gift and recently renamed as DKG Ignite. The panel was headed by Donna Brown, State Golden Gift Chair, and also included Bette Bridges, Jill Flanders, Joyce Gleason, and Dorothea Maynard, who returned from DKG Ignite just a few weeks ago.

The day consisted of much discussion about what skills are needed to be a leader, how bringing those with strengths different from your own is an asset, and how being a leader can be as simple as helping to rearrange chairs at a meeting or training. It was also pointed out that leaders need to treat their followers, especially the first follower to join their cause, as equals in order to ensure survival of the cause or organization, by a video of The Dancing Guy TED Talk. Handouts showed the difference in communication styles in those from different generations - especially Baby Boomers and Gen Xers - and how to effectively communicate with those of another generation, ways to market the organization to attract new educators, and how to create and use various forms of social media. The importance of social media and building online relationships was also touched on by member Jennifer Hoffer.

Aside from the training itself, attendees enjoyed a fabulous lunch put on by the facility and had time to network, share stories and ideas, and get to know each other better. One skill beneficial to leaders is to know those in the organization and where their strengths lie. While to the untrained eye networking may seem like no more than idle chitchat, leaders understand that the connections made and relationships formed through networking will benefit them in ways they may not even be aware of at the present time.

As educators we are used to leading those we educate. For many, being a leader outside the education setting may not seem as comfortable. It is important to remember, however, that being a leader in our organization does not necessarily need to mean taking on an office at the Chapter, State, or International level. It means being willing to pitch in, to fill a need when you see on, or offering the skills that are your strengths to someone whose strengths lie in another area. As Mat State President, Claire LaBonte, put it so succinctly and perfectly during the training, "We are all leaders!"

Beverly became President of her chapter (Alpha Gamma) within two years, and later, President of Massachusetts State (Alpha Upsilon) from '89-'91. She was chosen for the Area II Achievement Award in '89 as well as the State Achievement Award in 2005.

Beverly was selected to attend Golden Gift, a fully paid two-week Leadership course of work at University of Texas in Austin, TX. In 1993 she served on the International Membership Committee for four years. She became Executive Secretary of Alpha Upsilon State for a five-year term, 2000-2005.

After moving to Hyannis, she joined the Zeta chapter and assumed the Presidency, working to add members to the chapter. She presented multiple workshops featuring her own poetry, later to be printed, in her manuscript "The Crow's Nest Chronicles." She wrote a Ceremony of Remembrance, with a script and handwritten hymn "Their Lives We Celebrate". The Ceremony was presented at an International Conference and Northeast Regional Conference as well as State Conventions.

Beverly taught in Sutton Elementary and moved to the High School after being given a rare Leave of Absence to get her MA in English. She became to President of the Sutton Teachers Association and later was elected to the State Mass Teachers Association Board which involved traveling to and from Boston on weekends.

Whatever she did, she did with enthusiasm and excellence.
