

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

Looking to become more involved or learn more about education advocacy? The US Forum is hosting their seminar March 11-13, 2024! Registration opens Oct 31, 2023. The steering committee organizes this event to include educational issues and Congressional speakers, advocacy training, hotel accommodations and organized trips to DC offices and tours. You can plan to meet with your Congressional leaders and staff- going en masse makes an impact! The congressmen always wonder what is happening when they see us coming into the Congressional offices, especially if we have our red jackets on!! If you've never been to D.C. you can add some time to visit the Smithsonian among other great museums, government buildings and parks. A couple of new museums have opened, too!To keep updated on educational issues in a timely fashion I send information periodically to chapter presidents to email to their members. NEWS FROM THE US FORUM NORTHEAST REGION

HR 4259

A recent bill, H.R. 4259, introduced by Rep. Marcus Molinaro from New York was approved 39-0 by the House Committee on Education and Workforce mark-up and now goes to the floor of the US House for consideration. Schools would be required to notify parents of students with disabilities that they can invite people with additional knowledge or expertise to participate in individualized education program meetings under the proposed <u>Think Differently about Education Act</u>. IEP members invited by parents can include people who know the child or who have special expertise about that child's special education services.

CHRONIC ABSENCES A MAJOR CONCERN

The percentage of chronically absent public-school students nearly doubled from 15% in the 2018-19 school year to around 30% in 2021-22, following the pandemic, according to a recent study that collected administrative data from 40 states and the District of Columbia. The data accounts for over 92% of K-12 public school students in the United States. This data is worrisome in light of declining test scores.

The report came on the same day as <u>an Education Department announcement</u> including initiatives to bolster state and district efforts to tackle absenteeism. The department cited evidence-based practices to drive attendance increases, like home-visiting and texting parents.

Although the US Forum does not advocate nor endorse specific candidates, in light of the Mental Health resolution, passed at the 7/10/2022 US Forum meeting in New Orleans, we want to update you on current legislation that addresses our goals and encourage you to take action if you so choose.

HR 744 Supporting the Mental Health of Educators and Staff Act of 2023 was referred to the House Subcommittee on Health (from the House Committee on Energy and Commerce, Education and the Workforce) in February 2023. See the attached summary of the bill. Between February and June 2023, the bill has acquired 10 co-sponsors. But it has not moved out of committee to the larger Committee nor on to the House floor for a vote.

In further good news, the Senate has also just introduced a companion bill S. 2530 on 7-26-23 by Senator Robert P. Casey (PA) that is the parallel bill to HR 744. Similar encouragement needs to go to your senators.

We need a Call to Action asking DKG members to review the bills and, if they are so inclined, to write their Congressional representatives asking them to:

- (1) co-sponsor the bill
- (2) urge its swift passage into law.

If your representative is already a co-sponsor, you might write a thank you and urge them to push to have it sent out of committee for a vote.

Now is the time for Congress members to hear about the needs of educators for mental health support. Educators and other school staff need to know that Congress is aware of their needs, and recognizes that stress and other mental health concerns are contributing to staffing shortages, and that Congress supports those educators. Congress took bi-partisan action in 2022 to pass the Dr. Lorna Breen Health Care Provider Protection Act (HR 1667) recognized the need to support the mental health of first responders. *It is time to do the same for educators*.

Feel free to use this fact box to communicate with your Representative and Senators.

Fact Box: Mental Health in the Schools

- Educators are 3 times more likely to report symptoms of depression than other working adults (RAND) Nearly 3/4 of teachers and 85% of principals report frequent stress compared to 1/3 of other adults.
- K-12 educators are ranked as having the highest burnout levels of ANY profession 44% compared to 30% (Gallop Workforce Survey)
- Only 2% of teachers report their districts as offering extensive mental health supports (Merrimack)






THE DKG-MA VIRTUAL BOOK CLUB

~Upcoming Books~




OCTOBER 16th: THE GOOD LEFT UNDONE by Adriana Trigiani

NEWS FROM THE US FORUM NORTHEAST REGION

FACTS ACT:

The FACTS Act was introduced this week with bi-partisan support by U.S. Representative Susan Bonamici from Oregon and U.S. Representative Kevin Kiley from California. FACTS is the Fentanyl Awareness for Children and Teens in Schools. It would create a federal task force to improve federal responses to youth misuse of synthetic opioids, and overdoses. It also calls for federal data collection about the prevalence in secondary schools and provides additional resources to schools. Both U.S. Representatives are looking for additional co-sponsors.

The FACTS Act is endorsed by: Song for Charlie; American Federation of Teachers (AFT); National Education Association (NEA); National PTA; National Association of School Psychologists (NASP); AASA, The School Superintendents Association; National Association of Elementary School Principals (NAESP); National Association of Secondary School Principals (NASSP); National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI); American Psychological Association (APA); National Association of Counties (NACo); and US Conference of Mayors.

UPCOMING ZOOM:

The Mental Health Subcommittee of the US Forum is pleased to announce its latest Wellness opportunity. Have you ever heard of "Forest Bathing?" What is it? What does it have to do with wellness? Be sure to attend on Zoom on October 4, 2023, at 8 p.m. Eastern. Linda McLean is a member of Beta Chi Chapter in Michigan and has studied the practice for about three years now and has become a Certified Guide through the Forest Therapy Hub group based in Spain (https://foresttherapyhub.com/).

The title of her presentation is: "Forest Bathing - For the Health of It."

A short description - Forest Bathing comes from the practice of Shinrin Yoku which began in Japan in the 1980s. It is a well-researched and proven health-based program that uses a slow and mindful walk in a forest or other nature area with specific activities to open one's senses and connect with nature. A Forest Bathing Guide provides the specific sequential steps to lead the group through these activities. The practice of Forest Bathing can be the catalyst for a new sense of well-being that will last a lifetime.
