



Hello Sisters.

March can certainly come in like a lion, and with wind, snow, graupel, sleet, rain, and slush! I definitely prefer the gentle almost warm breezes, crocuses, daffodils, and tulips....

Here we are, looking at spring, rebirth, and new growth! That sounds like the common threads for DKG in Massachusetts. Since our Fall Conference in Franklin, we have seen some membership growth, but sadly, the closing of another Chapter. Sisters from Alpha Gamma have been welcomed into surrounding chapters, and our active member number stands at 402.

During our February Executive Board Meeting, the 21 of us present discussed ideas for meeting programs, fundraisers, community outreach, and new communities of educators to contact. To that end, I have opened invitations to our Spring Conference to my colleagues in the Early Education field.

Too often, public educators forget the remarkable care and neurological support that occurs with children from birth through age five, in their homes, and in their childcare settings. As principal of a school serving 350 preschoolers, kindergarteners, and first graders for 15 years, I had first-hand knowledge of the amazing learning and socialization that happens. We were committed to connecting with the childcare providers in our community, ensuring the transition to school was as worry-free as possible for our children and their families.

As you know, childcare comes in many forms: large centers like the YMCA, Brighter Beginnings, Head Start, and small family home based groups, as well as grandparents and neighbors. We call this a mixed delivery system, and I believe early care is often overlooked because it is usually such a short time need for families. But it is absolutely necessary.



Wow! March already! We hope you are excited for spring and the holidays that will be celebrated soon. Love listening to the birds chirping already.



Using data from the State's Organizational Health Survey conducted by Carol LaPolice in the spring, they drew several conclusions applicable to Alpha Chapter. Using these concepts, they explored the topic of *What does our chapter need to be effective* with members at the meeting.

Questions for discussion began with "What brought you here today?" and "What brings you to our meetings?" Then Dr. Ann and Dr. Sharon presented a graphic they developed called "The Cycle of DKG Members." Using the model, they shared some of their basic conclusions for the Alpha Chapter from the survey. Members then identified actions that they could take, individually and collectively, to become more effective.

A quick look at the results suggests that fellowship, fun and food bring members to meetings. A more effective chapter includes all active members participating in meetings, engaged in the committee work of the chapter, being held accountable for following through on assigned tasks, being recognized, and celebrating their successes.

Dr. Ann and Dr. Sharon will review the ideas collected at the meeting and share the findings at the next Executive Board. These results will then be used to develop a Strategic Plan for the next biennium.
