MEMORIES OF DR. MARY T. CONNOLLY

When the Massachusetts contingent arrived in New Orleans, Mary Connolly

greeted us with the "layout" of the land which included a nearby restaurant where we could get an affordable breakfast. It seemed Mary was always there before we arrived and had nuggets of information for us. Tales of Mary Connolly are replete among Alpha Upsilon Massachusetts members of a certain age. Past State President, Beverly Shaw Johnson gathered a number of them in the following article.



Dr. Mary T. Connolly and Dr. Catherine Maney were great pals. They also set the standard for two decades of Alpha Upsilon, Massachusetts State women who were guided by their leadership. Dr. Mary Connolly's biennium as State President was 1979-1981 which coincided with my first year on the State Executive Board as Alpha Gamma Chapter President in 1980. I was in awe of Mary's ability to lead and preside at big meetings, and the "Leadership Seed" was planted.

It was that State Fall Workshop, held in Auburn, MA, when I roomed with my Chapter Vice President, Anita Newman, and we discovered that the door in the wall led to an adjoining room. We were led to this observation when, long after the Friday night Executive Board meeting, we were having a very loud discussion about our "idiot school superintendent" (who was also a notorious union buster), and our comments must have gotten out of hand.) Suddenly, there was a very sharp rapping on that adjoining door, and before we could even respond, we heard the unmistakable voice of Dr. Mary Connolly, "PIPE DOWN, LADIES!" We were mortified! Dr. Connolly and her roommate, Dr. Catherine Maney, were right next door! We figured we would be blackballed from the Society forever, but she greeted us with a twinkle in her eye at breakfast the next morning, and a hearty, "GOOD MORNING, LADIES!" At lunch, during our Fall Workshop we heard from Chrissy Howard, a representative from Safe Passage. I think her moving presentation sparked interest in those present. I hope chapters will be moved to help this organization and the good work is does in Guatemala.



Delta Kappa Gamma is on life support, and soon may expire. When it does, the funeral will be a quiet affair held at a cemetery near you. Flowers are requested: red roses. Soloists will be singing *The Delta Kappa Gamma Song*, even though it may already have had its demise. Clergy from around the country will be performing the White Rose Ceremony of Remembrance and State Presidents, left adrift, will give the eulogy.

Massachusetts is celebrating our 75th anniversary this year and we have lost more than 1200 members and 14 chapters (down from 36 chapters to 22) since our 50th anniversary. If we don't wish to see this as our obituary, we have to really work at gaining new members and bringing back lapsed members. Here are some tips:

Bring in New Members:

 Look in newspaper for articles on women educators who have done something noteworthy and ask them to speak about it at your next meeting. Encourage them to come again and join.

- Teachers still teaching can make a list of great teachers, and invite them to come to a meeting. Pay for their meals if possible.
- Go to teacher leaders in the district and ask them to speak, and then join and recommend others.

Bring Back Lapsed Members:

- Since the research shows 50% of lapsed members would come back if asked, ASK!
- Use chapter's Form18 and 18A to compile a list (your treasurer has forms in her records).
- Send a personal note followed by a call, telling them they are missed, and telling about the new and exciting projects and focus of the society.
- Invite them to next meeting and offer a ride.
- When a former member attends, make her feel welcome and get her involved immediately in chapter activities.
- Have reinstatement cards ready so they can join and pay dues. They are not voted on. Constitution Article III Sec F.

"THERE IS NOTHING OLD HAT ABOUT THIS CREW!"

Using hats as props, six members of the New DKG ALPHA UPSILON, MA STATE LITERACY COUNCIL for 2015-2017 kicked off the New Year with a rousing Call to Action: LITERACY LIBERATES! In concert with State President, Martha Cotton's theme for her biennium, MAKING MEMBERSHIP MEANINGFUL IN MASSACHUSETTS, and following an all-member training session on Membership Recruitment and Retention by Membership Chairman, Dr. Anita Newman, this group came in singing and cheering for a renewed focus on Literacy Programs and Projects throughout the state for the next two years.

At the beginning of Saturday morning's General Session, attendees were greeted by a series of Literacy in Massachusetts display boards, colorfully



arranged in the DKG Registration Lobby and created by Literacy Council Advisor, Martha Colamaria. Upon entering the session, everyone received a one-page Literacy Council Questionnaire, to be filled out and returned by the end of the session, as well as an attached 2-page CHALLENGE TO COMMITMENT handout, also compiled by Martha Colamaria, a champion for literacy in DKG and Rotary Int'l.

Members were asked to take the handout back to their Chapters for discussion, and to find a chapter member willing to be their <u>Literacy Point Person</u>, if they did not already have a Literacy Committee Chairman. Then, in order to acquaint attendees at the session with members of the new Literacy Council, members introduced themselves, as well as their individual literacy passions:

<u>AREA V.</u> – Gail Laffer, Alpha Zeta Chapter, and Council Co-Chair, is Past President of the South Shore Reading Association, and a long-time advocate for

Literacy. She described her volunteer work through Generations, Inc. as a Reading Coach for young children at an after school program in Boston. Gail will work with Upsilon and Alpha Iota Chapters.

AREA I. - Diana Grady, Alpha Theta Chapter, described her work as Director of the Buzzards Bay Writing Project and its sponsorship of 3 Summer Literacy Camps for children, grades 3-12. Diana will work with Theta, Kappa, Alpha Beta, and Alpha Kappa chapters to identify literacy needs in their areas.

AREA II.- Christine Bonci, Alpha Nu, was introduced by her "stand-in" and our Literacy Council Advisor, Martha Colamaria. As Alpha Upsilon State Past President and Webmaster, Christine looks forward to spreading the "Literacy Liberates fever" across the state, with the help of the website. She is currently employed by NCSD, a Northeast Consortium preparing and supervising teacher candidates to meet new Certification Standards, including the Literacy Requirement. Christine will work with Alpha Alpha, Alpha Gamma, & Alpha Mu.

<u>AREA 1V.</u> – Jillayne Flanders, Alpha Epsilon Chapter President, is a 27-year career School Principal, and was named Massachusetts Principal of the Year in 2010. Jill described her involvements in various literacy collaborations over the years, and detailed the huge literacy challenges facing many families and educators in Area IV. Newly retired, Jill is ready for a new DKG challenge and looks forward to working with Alpha and Chi Chapters.

<u>AREA VI.</u> – Gabrielle Montevecchi, Epsilon Chapter President, has just completed her first year as Principal at the Hannah Elementary School in Beverly, MA. She focused on the challenges for literacy in her young students, their families, and the impact of testing on effective learning. Gabrielle looks forward to working with Alpha Eta and Alpha Xi Chapters.

<u>AREA III.</u> – Beverly Shaw Johnson, Zeta Chapter, and Past State President, focused on the connection between life-long learning and literacy. As a poet and teacher of writing, she urged members to celebrate the literary arts in both Chapter programs and projects. She said that presenting workshops and poetry readings at Chapter, Regional, and International DKG meetings has been "a true personal and professional growth experience". She will work with Beta, Eta, and Alpha Lambda.

Finally, as Literacy Council Co-Chair, Ms Johnson wrapped up the session with the following statement: We believe that as DKG KEY WOMEN EDUCATORS, we are <u>all</u> Champions of Literacy—and if we reflect that Focus in Chapter Programs, Projects, and Outreach Efforts, our organization will appeal to new members. LET'S GIVE THE GIFT OF MEMBERSHIP to the New Generation of Women Educators, and TOGETHER, WE CAN MAKE A DIFFERENCE!!

Gamma Society International membership in 1960, and for a few years, confined her work to leadership in Upsilon Chapter and her position as Principal of the Ohrenberger School in West Roxbury, MA. We know she was well-respected as an administrator, and an active parishioner in the St. John Chrysostom Parish of West Roxbury. However, beginning in the early 1970's, Mary began to assume elective offices at the DKG state level, becoming State President in 1979. She was extremely well-organized, and began immediately to mentor those Chapter Presidents and younger teachers in whom she saw potential. Martha Colamaria remembers well the kindness and support she received from Dr. Connolly, who even went out of her way to provide transportation to state meetings, "like my personal taxi driver. It was personal. She always did everything with great wit and charm."

Dr. Connolly was initiated into Delta Kappa

Past State President and Executive Secretary, Christine Boncirecalls, "Mary was probably the most dedicated DKG member I ever knew. She also loved her work as a public school principal! She raised the bar for the teachers under her tutelage. She was professional, compassionate, bright, and definitely had an Irish wit!"

Terri Maffeo, Immediate Past State Executive Secretary and Past State President, sent this recollection: My first and fondest memory of Dr. Mary T. Connolly took place at the State Spring Convention at the Sea Crest Hotel on May 5, 1990. The Parade of Chapter Presidents was about to begin. She walked over to me as I stood in line and said very seriously, "You are destined for greatness in Delta Kappa Gamma"—because we both had on the same dress! She then whispered in my ear, that, of course, my dress was a smaller size

than hers! I looked at her face, and saw that wry smile. From that moment on, Mary "took me under her wing" and mentored me every step of my journey in DKG.

So many members have funny stories to tell about Mary. She was noted for "staking out the territory" whenever the Massachusetts delegation was attending a Regional or International Convention in another state. Kit Dunlap was always amazed at Mary's ability to find the best restaurants and coffee shops "just around the corner," within a short time after arrival. "She was our GPS." She also, according to Past State President, Donna Brown, liked to have a good time with her "ducklings," and was willing to try new things. I think it was in Texas that Donna introduced Mary to Donna's favorite New England Iced Tea. Mary thought it was a very tasty drink and ordered another. Of course, when it hit, that was another story. I don't think Dr. Connolly every ordered another "N. E. Iced Tea!"

Bette Bridges remembers Mary Connolly being Chairman of the Friday Night Dinner at Plimouth Plantation, which was part of the 50thAnniversary of Alpha Upsilon State. Bette had been asked to plan an assigned seating chart for that event, and it was her "first assignment for the state." On the day the list arrived by mail from Mary, Bette wound up in the hospital with pneumonia. Because she was afraid to let Mary down, Bette had her husband Ken bring the list to the hospital, did the chart, and had her husband drive to West Roxbury to meet Mary in a parking lot to deliver the plan. More registrations had come in, so the process was repeated, and the second time the plan made its way to Mary, Ken bought her coffee at Friendly's.

They must have gotten to know each other, because Dr. Connolly loved to tease Bette about her "boyfriend, Ken," whenever they met.

Actually, I think Dr. Mary Connolly thought a lot of the husbands who supported their wives as partners, and encouraged them to fully participate in the work of the Society. We were all very busy with our careers and families. During my biennium as State President, we had the first Planning Meeting for the 50th. Birthday of the State at my home in Sutton, It was an all-day meeting with a lunch, and of course, Dr. Mary Connolly arrived early. Early enough to discover my husband, Kelton, in our den, watching a game. When she found out that he was an Elementary School Principal of a large school in Millbury, MA, she knew she had hit the jackpot! They spent more than an hour sharing "Administrator War Stories," and Kaaren Harrington, had to bellow a few times that, "Mary! We're having a meeting out here!" She finally dragged Mary out of the den, and Kelton was still laughing. Mary told me, that had it been legal, Kelton deserved "Honorary Membership."

From 1981 to 1990, Dr. Catherine Maney, Mary's great friend, served as State Executive Secretary. For the next decade, Dr. Mary T. Connolly led Alpha Upsilon State as Executive Secretary, a true mentor to Massachusetts women educators, and a great role model. In 2000, she retired; I applied for the position and was appointed to a five-year term. 


