DKG Book Discussion Groups - Choose Your Book! Join the Discussion!

Snow may be on the ground but the Literacy Council is looking forward to the 75th Anniversary Spring Conference of Alpha Epsilon State. On Sunday morning from 9-10 A. M. there will be three book discussion groups from which you may choose.



Please select your book and be ready for some interesting conversations. To help you decide which discussion group you want to join, below is a brief description of each book.

<u>The Wright Brothers</u> by David McCullough, led by Kit Dunlap (Alpha Theta)

On a winter day in 1903, in the Outer Banks of North Carolina, two unknown brothers from Ohio changed history. But it would take the world some time to believe what had happened: the age of flight had begun, with the first heavier – than- air powered machine carrying a pilot. Who were these men and how was it that they achieved what they did? In this thrilling book the author tells the human side of the Wright Brothers by drawing on the immense riches of the Wright Papers, including private diaries, notebooks, scrapbooks, and more than a thousand letters from private correspondence. He also includes the little known contributions of their

sister, Katherine, without whom things might well have gone differently for them.

The Boys in the Boat by Daniel Brown, led by Denise Kochanski and Michelle Kokoszka (Beta) Out of the depths of the Depression comes the improbable, intimate account of how nine working class boys from the American West showed the world at the 1936 Olympics in Berlin what true grit really meant. With rowers who were the sons of loggers, shipyard workers, and farmers, the University of Washington's eight oar crew was never expected to defeat the elite teams of the East Coast and Great Britain but they did, going on to shock the world by challenging the German boat rowing for Adolf Hitler. Drawing on the boy's own journal and vivid memories of a once in a lifetime

shared dream, Brown has created an unforgettable portrait an era and a celebration of a remarkable achievement.

All The Light We Cannot See by Anthony Doerr, led by Gail Laffer (Alpha Zeta)

Ten years in the writing, All the Light We Cannot See is an epic work of historical fiction. With richly detailed language and characters that are both brave

and heartwarming, Doerr weaves together the stories of a French girl named Marie- Laure who has lost her eyesight and a German orphan named Werner. As Hitler's occupied territory grows, Marie Laure and Werner's lives and families are torn apart by the war, yet this gorgeous novel is the story of people who against all odds, find good in one another.

A Brief History of Alpha Upsilon State by Kit Dunlap

Alpha Upsilon was the 44th state to join Delta Kappa Gamma Society International on June 30, 1941. The installation took place at the Hotel Statler in Boston. Following the ceremony, the dinner was attended by approximately 200 members from 35 states. Election of officers took place after the banquet.

President - Sara E. Chase - Elementary school principal in Springfield

First VP - Winifred Bain - Wheelock College in Boston

Second VP - Grace Pierce - Lowell State Teachers College

Rec. Secretary - Ann Smith - Wellesley College

Treasurer - Elizabeth Foster - Worcester State College

All together there were sixteen State Founders and 18 Charter members.

Sara E. Chase passed away on April 21, 1943 but did accomplish by May 16, 1942 to organize Alpha Chapter for the Berkshire, Hampden, Franklin, and Hampshire counties. Winifred Bain served as President Pro Tem until Dr. Marion Twiss was elected to finish the Sara E. Chase term of office.

Beta Chapter from Bristol County was the second chapter established in September 1943 and Gamma Chapter in Suffolk County in May 1946.

Direct quote--"In the light of the present day trouble within many of the southern states, it seems quite fitting that the following be enclosed as a vital and memorable action of our organization. Several members of Alpha Upsilon objected to the use of the word "white" as listed in Article III on membership, section 3, 4, 7, 8 and 12 of the Constitution and By-laws of the Delta kappa Gamma Society. Some members resigned soon after joining Delta Kappa Gamma because they would not be members of an organization which discriminated on the basis of race or color. When Dr. Margaret Stroh came as the guest speaker at one of the early meetings of delta Kappa Gamma, she was told about the objections voiced on the use of the word "white". As a result of this conversation with Dr. Stroh it was voted that a letter be sent to the national office about this matter. The communication is here submitted in copy form.

TO THE NATIONAL ORGANIZATION OF DELTA KAPPA GAMMA May 2, 1944

Alpha Chapter of Massachusetts Delta Kappa Gamma and the Massachusetts State Organization of delta Kappa Gamma wish to go on record as opposing the clause in the Constitution which discriminates for eligibility to membership in Delta Kappa Gamma Society against races other than the white race.

We believe that discrimination is an anachronism in the modern democratic world and that the future of the society will be best served by a policy which considers the individual on his own merit.

We are therefore recommending that the national organization of Delta Kappa Gamma strike out the word "white" in Article III, Sections 3, 4, 7. 8, and 12 of the Constitution.

Subsequently a "Draft of Proposed Revised Constitution for Delta Kappa Gamma Society" appeared with the word "white" deleted. At the National Convention in San Francisco on August 26 and 27, 1946 "Basic Rulings and Interpretations of the Constitution" with the word "white" omitted was adopted. Has this Constitution not been accepted many more Massachusetts Delta kappa Gamma members would have resigned from the organization."

Since the beginning the fund has provided thousands of dollars for members to benefit from opportunities to enrich their teaching strategies.

A big **THANK YOU** goes out to the following chapters that met The Christa McAuliffe Living Memorial Fund Challenge by donating \$30.00 or more to commemorate the 30th anniversary of Christa McAuliffe's ill-fated mission.


